Microsoft's .net environment has been blamed for depression and illness among product developers



nationwide. According to Dr. Luis Sansnet, companies that stick with old technologies face rising health care costs among their development groups. "Developers thrive on

new technologies, almost to the same extent that normal people require food. Companies who cannot control exposure to dangerous health hazards like .net will face pretty harsh terms when they renew their contracts with us." Representatives from Microsoft called the accusations "silly," but admitted that all Microsoft developers have access to .net technology.


Altman Featured on Dilbert
